Chassis & Steering Clinic

Jim spent some time in the classroom teaching the basics of front and rear end suspension and gave the details of the Corvair steering system.

Jim then gave a demonstration of how to use some rudimentary tools to perform wheel alignments. It was refreshing to see that a wheel alignment can be done at home without a \$50,000 machine.

n November of last year, ACC member Gary Walker, of the Pearcy community (outside of Hot Springs)) took delivery of a Bahama Green 1964 Corvair Monza Spyder convertible. Gary had searched the Internet and located the 64 Spyder (offered for sale) in Georgia.

Finding and purchasing the "early model" Corvair had been a fervent dream that Gary nurtured since his high school and college years.

In the short time that Gary has owned the sporty Monza convertible, he has been diligently taking steps to improve the car's appearance and enhance it's classic design appeal.

In February, while searching the Internet, Gary found a "for sale" listing for an aftermarket hardtop manufac-

tured to fit the 1963 and 64 Corvair convertible models. The seller hapened to be nearby, in Memphis.

In early March, Gary purchased the hardtop, seen pictured at the right. The hardtop is branded with the name "Esquire." Research reveals that the rare molded hardtop was manufactured by a company named Rivera. Rivera made hardtops for all 1961, 62, and 63 GM convertible models

My First Car

My first car was a Corvair. My second car was a Corvair. Although, technically the car I am

about to tell you about was my second, I have always considered it my first car. I am solely responsible for the selection and purchase of it. I have owned it since 1974. The reason I don't count the first Corvair I had as my first car is because I co-owned it with my older brother. It was "supposed" to be a present for me on my 16th birthday. For me, it was more

like an experience in brotherly love and weekend auto mechanics than a birthday present. Was I ever flabbergasted when my father told me I had to share the car with my

brother. Although the co-ownership didn't last long, my interest in Corvairs did.

After a few months, I started to look around

for another Corvair of my own. By that time, I had gained a lot of mechanical experience on that coowned car: it was down for repairs more often than

not. I was also on a first-name basis with Jay's Day-Nite auto parts on Grant road. Jay's was open until midnight.

Then, right under my nose, I found a deal too good to pass up. A classmate of mine, who also drove a Corvair, informed me that his car, a 1964 Monza convertible, 110hp, automatic, with 52,000 original miles, was broken down and he wanted to sell it.

Right about this time the formation of the club, Tucson Corvair Association, was taking place and I was fortunate to be involved. With a new car of my very own on the way and the support of lots of good people willing to help, I felt like I was doing the right thing. All I needed was the money.

The seller and I had agreed on a price of \$250. My father, who was a second generation car salesman/dealer had intentions of negotiating a lower price. After all, the car didn't run, and probably would need a complete engine overhaul.

I pleaded with him to let me handle it. I told him that the Kelsey Hayes knockoff wire wheels
