

Tucson Classics Car Show - Corvairs Present!

The 10th annual Tucson Classics Car Show was held on Saturday, October 15 with over 425 vehicles on parade. Among them were three Corvairs, Mike Lake's Red Rocket and Ron Bloom's Purple Rain, and Frank Pella's blue convertible. Best of show went to a '49 Chevy 3100 pickup, the Mayor's Award was picked up by a 1950 Ford Custom convertible, and 1950 Packard Victoria took home the Title Sponsor's Award. Because of the tremendous contention between two the Corvair owners, they were disqualified from receiving any prizes whatsoever. One owner claimed he the other was driving a Yugo Junkie and the other owner was sure that his competitor was going to win the Golden Outhouse Award.

In the end it was a very good show. It was very well run and the weather was perfect, Fellow TCA member Bob Moulton brought one of the Busses from Old Pueblo Trolley and the '27 Packard from the Franklin Museum was there.



Late Model Taillight Socket Blues







NAPA part number LS 6465 for use on the backup lights.

A recent discussion on the Virtual Vairs forum was about the availability of all metal tail-light/backup light sockets to replace the plastic units. The plastic ones have a tendency to come loose and fall out, and don't always make good ground. Several suggestions were made which included putting a #4 sheet metal screw in the plastic housing to hold the grounding shell in place to soldering a wire to the tab and grounding the other end to an adjacent bolt. NAPA sells a couple of Echlin sockets: one for the brake/taillights (p/n LS6469) and one for the backup lights (p/n LS6465). JT&T Products also offers the sockets (p/n 2578F and 2579F). They each have 6 metal tabs which serve to hold the socket secure in place and provide more places to make a good ground. They cost around 5 or 10 bucks per socket but have made several Corvair owners very happy.

Answer: They couldn't find where to put the gas!






Tech Tip

form the Fanbelt Flyer, Cactus Corvair Club by Bob Grisby

After driving for 15 minutes with the rear hub caps off (approx. 50 MPH), I stopped and checked the axle center by touch. The driver side could be held for only 2-3 seconds before pain, but the passenger side could be held 6+ seconds with only moderate heat noticed.

Conclusion was that the driver side bearing was developing heat due to friction of the bearing not performing in correct rolling manner. This test could be made to any early or late Corvair with the same results. After 15 minutes of driving at 50 MPH, if you check the rear axle center you

should only feel moderate heat (like heat from electric blanket). If the center feels hot then you have friction due to lack of lubrication or a bad bearing. This test is not valid if you drive on city streets due to the amount of braking involved. Testing while doing extended braking might show invalid results because the heat from braking friction could be mistaken for heat from bad bearings.



In-tank Electric Fuel Pump

This tech tip comes from Blake and Tim Palmer. A fuel pump that was intended for use in a Vega, among many other cars, can be used in the Corvair fuel tank by modifying the stock Corvair sending unit assembly. An Airtex E2485 pump can be used and costs around \$30. Many other companies make an equivalent pump as well. The pump runs at 4-6 psi with an output of 20-35 gpm. 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


Diagram of required modifications.
