Bring along a picnic lunch and have a good time.



TUNE - UP CLINIC FALL 1981

It is always difficult to assess the success of a tunEup clinic. Sometimes it has been the number of cars that we have looked at, other times it has been the number of problem areas that we have identified and sometimes corrected. Our efforts this time were a combination of both. We had 36 cars go through the line. Surprisingly, most of them were in great shape. Brake lights, headlights and directionals were all working. You are to be congratulated.

We did find some problems in the engine compartment. A couple of vacuum advance units were leaking. Not complete failures but small leaks in the diaphragm - difficult to detect. Both of them appeared to be original equipment and long past their planned obsolescence. One early model had its battery installed backwards. I mean the positive post was on the left side and the negative on the right. Had a pair of loooong cables. Needless to say, my remote starting switch didn't work too well until I noticed the problem. One car had the yellow starter wire and resistor wire disconnected. Your car will run fine but during starting you don't get the extra voltage. We also had a late model convertible come through the line. It was originally a coupe not the classiest customizing job in town. It had a few problems, mismatched carbs that someone had drilled a hole in the left one to install the "J" bolts. Chokes were not hooked up, just flapping. The rubber grommet that routes the fuel line through the firewall was replaced with a rag. When I saw the 2x4 supporting the driver's seat, I'd had enough.

The presence of Bob Hoffman and his SUN equipment made our handfull of timing lights, dwell meters and unisyns look insignificant. It was probably the first time many of our Corvairs were hooked up to such sophisticated equipment. In addition, the Performance Plus demonstration was most impressive. I am almost ready to try it but maybe I will wait for some other brave soul.

In closing, I would like to thank those who gave up their Sunday afternoon to serve the rest of the members. Remember the Economy Run in January. I have %aken the 64 Coupe out of storage for this event----- so beware, I will spend the next few weeks fine tuning the engine hoping it will make it further than its 37 mile performance during the last economy run.

AMAZING!

The weather was sunny and mild and the conversation was pleasant. The Corvairs moved efficiently from station to station, as many people graciously contributed their time and talents.

Periodically through the day, a 1978 Dodge Maxi-van pulled out of the parking area. Such an event would normally not arouse much interest. However, this was, in fact, a very remarkable demonstration. The van had been drained of all it's oil, just prior to being driven! By days end, the van had logged 24 miles without oil, and had not even overheated. Impossible? It would have been, without the use of an engine treatment product called "Performance Plus".

The engine treatment begins by thoroughly cleaning the internal parts of the engine that it comes in contact with. Then the clean pores of the metal are impregnated with special resins. This results in an amazingly effective lubricating quality, which remains in the engine when the oil is drained. (It is recommended that you do not try this demonstration with your own car.)

"Performance Plus" is a product of particular interest to T.C.A. members, as it can be a tremendous help in preserving our fine historic vehicles. As an added bonus, it can substancially reduce operating and maintanance costs.

The members of T.C.A. wish to express their gratitude to Lyle Ray and Don Drensky, for putting on this remarkable demonstration. In addition, Lyle and Don were instrumental in obtaining the services of Bob Hoffman and his van, containing \$20,000 worth of Sun testing equipment, which added tremendously to the effectiveness of the tune-up clinic.

TECH TIP

"Are you cold, tired and hungry? I can help you! Eat a hearty meal, get 8 hours sleep, and change the blower motor in your Corvair.

"This is all you have to do. Trot down to your favorite Auto Salvage and purchase a 1970 or newer Air Conditioner blower motor from a Buick, Cadillac, Pontiac or Olds, (Chevy will not work). This can be purchased for approximately \$10 or \$15.

"When you arrive home, jack up the right rear of your Corvair and place a jack stand just ahead of the rear wheel. Now take a 5/16 socket with an extension and ratchet, hop on your trusty ole creeper and roll under the right rear axle. Look ahead and above it and you will see six screws that are the same size as the wrench in your hand. In the center of all these screws there is a wire plugged into the blower. Unplug by pulling down on the end of this wire. Now remove all those little screws that fit your wrench and the motor will fall right out into your face. (May be a good idea to remove face or wear goggles.) Now place both motors on work bench and notice the difference in fans. Remove the 7/16 nut from the center of fan and install the fan from the old blower on the new one. No hop back on your trusty ole creeper with the new motor in hand and turn all those little screws in the opposite direction from when you removed the old motor, plug the wire into the new motor and you are done. (Some motors have a bullet or spade terminal, so you may have to change the terminal on the end of the wire.) Now before driving off, don't forget to remove the jack stand!

"Before you try out your new blower, pull your cap down over your ears or the defroster will blow it off. Also, expect dirt, leaves, pencils, dollar bills and various and sundry items to blow out of the defroster outlets. If any of the above happens, your operation was successful. If not, I either wrote the directions wrong or you followed them wrong. I'll let you figure that out.






