


#### WHAT ARE "FUZZIES", ANYWAY?

A few weeks ago the board members decided it would be a good idea to make "fuzzies" available for all who were brave enough to attempt the installation. All of the materials were ordered and as soon as the clips arrive we'll be ready to go. I recently installed a set on my Lakewood and was very pleased with the results.

So what is a "fuzzy", anyway?? Well, they really aren't called fuzzies by anyone except those who want you to know what they are talking about. GM calls them a strip assembly, our supplier calls them beaded weatherstrip. We call them "fuzzies" because they are fuzzy! Just so you'll know what were talking about, in Fig. 1 below find 10.710 Strip. There is one on each side of each window. They help keep the window from rattling and/or getting scratched on the sheet metal of the door.








FIGURE 2 Fuzzy for 60-64

Figures 2 and 3 show the different types of fuzzies that Corvairs use. Fig. 2 is for early model cars and 95s. Fig. 3 is for late model cars. The only difference between the fuzzies we found and the originals is the bead along the top edge is stainless steel on the new ones and is painted on the orginals. The paint always chips and the bead gets rusty. Fig.4 shows the clips that have to be installed so the fuzzies can be held in place.

The installation is really not all that bad. Basically, the fuzzies have to cut to length and the clips installed. I'll go through the operation step by step for those who want to brave an attempt!!

#### INSTALLATION:

- 1. Remove old fuzzies as carefully as possible so that they can be used as patterns.
- 2. Cut a length of fuzzy  $\frac{1}{2}$ " longer than the old one.
- 3. Notch each end as shown in the sketch below. Cut the fuzzy with a good pair of cross cuts or tin snips. Try to cut about half way through the bead as well.



- 4. Now bend the end of the bead down. This finishes the ends off.
- 5. Using the old fuzzy assembly (or the door itself) as a guide, mark the location of each clip. If the fuzzy is a curved one like the rear side window of the late coupes, bend the fuzzy very carefully into the right shape (the stuff is flexible and will bend quite nicely) before locating the clips.
- ible and will bend quite nicely) before locating the clips. Lay the fuzzy with the fuzzy side down on a good hard surface. I used the end of my vise - the garage floor didn't work nearly as well. With a hammer very carefully tap the clip into place just enough to get it started through the backing of the fuzzy, being careful not to hit the stainless bead. Now, with a flat ended punch and the hammer, drive the clip prongs all the way through the fuzzy. If your surface is good and hard, the prongs of the clips work kind of like staples and, voila, the clips and the fuzzy become an "assembly".
- 7. Now, you can install the new assemblies into their respective locations and you're ready to go. Be sure that you are really ready to install them because once they are in they won't come back out without some damage (to the fuzzy).

The orginal clips for the trucks are somewhat different than the clips that are presently available. Nevertheless if you are installing them on your van they work just fine but the fuzzy ends up being about an 1/8" lower than it orginally was.

If you have any troubles, please feel free to call me (743-9185) or wait until this fall when we are planning a clinic. So until then, don't shave your fuzzies??!!

P.S. The fuzzy kits will be available through the merchandising chairman hopefully at the next meeting. We're still waiting on the clips to arrive.

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
