YOU PICKED A WINNER

The oldest Corvairs are now over 22 years old. The last built are now over 13 years old. Numerically, the average age of a Corvair is almost 20. The fact that they are still eminently rational cars to use for everyday transportation is a testimony to the loyal support of their owners.



HOW TO GET A SUPERB WHEEL BALANCE

Here's a good way to get the best possible wheel balance with a minimum of weights. In fact, it may work out that no weights are needed at all.

First remove the brake drum, put it on a balance and find the heavy side. Next, put the wheel with mounted tire on the balance and find their heavy side. The last step is to line the heavy side in the drum 180 degrees apart from the wheel's heavy side and balance the drum and wheel as an assembly.

This may sound like a lot of effort but it results in the minimum amount of tire weights. Minimum weight is especially important in racing where low unsprung weight is desired.

Editor's note: Cadillac is doing a similar thing with the new J-body Cimmaron. The heavy side of the tire and wheel are located by computer before assembly. The heavy spots are placed 180 degrees apart when the when the tire is mounted on the wheel and then it receives final balancing. This in conjunction with very tight roundness tolerances give a smooth ride in a light car.






